David Weber – Guest of Honor

David Weber is primarily known as the creator of the Honor Harrington Series (largely based on the C.S. Forester’s Horatio Hornblower series of books). In his stories, he creates a consistent and rationally explained technology and society. Even when dealing with fantasy themes, the magical powers are treated like another technology with supporting rational laws and principles.

Many of his stories have military, particularly naval, themes, and fit into the military science fiction genre. He challenges current gender roles in the military by assuming that a gender-neutral military service will exist in his futures, and by frequently placing female leading characters in what have previously been seen as traditionally male roles, he has explored the challenges faced by women in the military and politics.

His most popular and enduring character is Honor Harrington, whose story, together with the “Honorverse” she inhabits, has been developed through 13 novels and four shared-universe anthologies as of spring 2006 (other works are in production).

Dean Morrissey – Official Artist

Dean Morrissey has been drawing and creating characters since his childhood in Boston. Inspired by Disney matte paintings and comic book heroes early on, he grew to appreciate the works of the masters, such as Rembrandt, Vermeer, Pyle and N.C. Wyeth.

Morrissey worked a variety of jobs until deciding to paint full time in the late 1970’s. He worked as a freelance book cover illustrator for over 15 different publishers in New York and won numerous awards. Morrissey is self taught, and considers the demands of cover illustration to have been his “art school”.

In 1991, Morrissey began to paint some images from a story that he was creating. His books include *Ship of Dreams* (1994), *The Great Kettles: A Tale of Time* (1997), *The Song of Celestine Little*, (1998), *The Christmas Ship* (2000), *A Christmas Carol* (2000), *The Moon Robber* (2001), *The Winter King* (2002), *The*

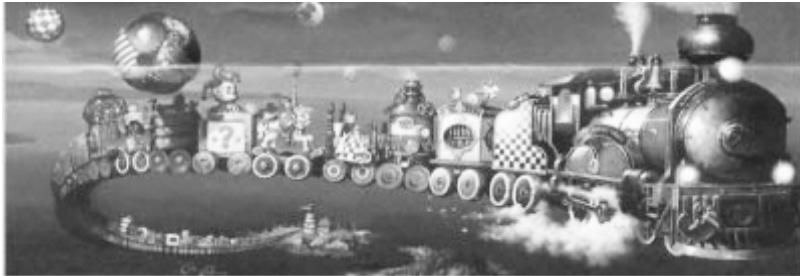
Take Amtrak to South Station and transfer there to the Silver Line to World Trade Center Station (see below).

From World Trade Center Station

Go up the escalators (following the signs to Viaduct St.) After you leave the station, turn left and walk along World Trade Center Drive until it ends at Summer Street. Cross the street and turn left. The hotel is about halfway down the block. Total walk is about ¼ mile.

Morrissey lives with his wife Shan and his son on the South Shore of Massachusetts.

Bruce Coville – Special Guest

Bruce Coville is the author of over ninety books for young readers, including the international best-seller *My Teacher Is an Alien*. He has been a teacher, a toy maker, a cookware salesman, and a grave digger. In addition to his work as an author, Bruce is much in demand as a speaker and as a storyteller. He is also the founder and president of Full Cast Audio, a company dedicated to producing unabridged recordings of children's books in a full-cast format. He promises faithfully that there will indeed be a third Unicorn book coming out later this year. Boskone is proud to be debuting *The One Right Thing*, a collection of his short fiction as this year's Boskone book.

Seanan McGuire – Featured Filker

Seanan McGuire is a filker, stand-up comic, poet, short-story author, comic artist, and occasional convention diva; she puts far too much energy into being hard to categorize. Come and see what happens when Seanan is set loose on the Boston area, hitting their regional science fiction scene with all the gusto she can manage (and if you've met her, you know that's a lot of gusto).

Howard Waldrop – NESFA Press Guest

Howard Waldrop is a science fiction author who works primarily in short fiction. Waldrop's stories combine elements such as alternate history, American popular culture, the American south, old movies (and character actors), classical mythology, and rock 'n' roll music. His style is sometimes obscure or elliptical. The stories are often considered entertaining: "Night of the Cooters" is *The War of the Worlds* told from the perspective of a Texas sheriff (a homage to Slim Pickens); "Heirs of the Perisphere" involves robotic Disney characters waking up in the far future; "Fin de Cyclé" describes the Dreyfus affair from the perspective of bicycle enthusiasts.

Several of his stories have been nominated for awards; "The UglyChicken" – about the dodo – won a Nebula award for best novelette in 1980, and also a

World Fantasy Award for Short Fiction in 1981. This is perhaps his best known work.

Registration

Registration for Boskone will be open Friday (4 pm-9 pm) through Sunday in the Grand A pre-function area (West end of the concourse lower-level hallway). Check posted signs in the event of a Registration room change.

Everyone—committee, staff, program participants, artists, hucksters—must register there to get name badges and convention materials. We will make it as painless an experience as we can! You can help: Please remember to bring government-issued photographic identification, such as a driver's license or passport, to registration. If you arrive late, ask at the Convention Office (near the opposite end of the pre-function area, by the escalators) about after-hours registration.



If you haven't yet bought a membership and wish to do so before the convention, a registration form is available at www.boskone.org/join. You may register on-line or print and mail the form to us at PO Box 809, Framingham, MA 01701, or you may fax it to us at 617-776-3243. The price of an advance membership is \$45 through **January 22, 2008**. We accept Visa, MasterCard, checks (in US dollars drawn on a US bank), and money orders.

At-con rates are: Full membership—\$54, Friday—\$16, Saturday—\$34, Sunday—\$18. We also accept cash at the con. After January 22nd, at-the-door memberships will be available online.

The cost of **Dragonslair** is included in the con membership, so all children ages 7-12 who use these services must be convention members. There is no reduced rate for children. However, children who stay with their parents at all times are considered "kids-in-tow" who need not have memberships. ("Kids-in-tow" do not receive any convention materials.) From the NORTH SHORE via route 1A

- Take 1A south towards Logan airport.
- From Logan airport, the Westin is about 3 miles. Take the Mass Pike westbound (Ted Williams Tunnel) to exit 25, South Boston.
- Make slight right onto Congress St.
- Make a right onto D St. Make a slight right onto Summer St. The Westin will be on the right.

From the SOUTH

- Take I-93 north to exit 20 toward I-90/Logan Airport/South Station/BCEC.
- Take the fork towards South Station.
- At second set of lights, make a right onto Kneeland St.
- Go to end, and make a left. South Station will be on your right.
- At the third light, make a right onto Summer St.
- Go over the Fort Point Bridge, stay straight for about a mile. The Westin will be on your right after the new convention center [BCEC].

From the WEST

- Take I-90 (Mass Pike) eastbound to the South Boston exit
- Exiting the Pike, take the left (of 3) choices which is marked "local traffic"
- At the first light, turn right onto Congress St and go under an elevated roadway.
- Turn right at the next light which is D. St.
- Cross back over the highway and the next light is Summer St.
- Either turn right and the hotel entrance is immediately on your left, or go straight and look for the garage entrance on your right.

By Air

From Logan International: The simplest way is to take the Silver Line Bus Rapid Transit to the World Trade Center station. (see from World Trade Center Station, below). A taxi is also a reasonable choice and will cost in the low teens (somewhat more during rush hour), or you can take a shared van service to the hotel for about \$10. Boskone's hotel is the Westin Waterfront in South Boston, Massachusetts, located just south of Chinatown off the Massachusetts Turnpike. The hotel rates per night are: single \$145, double \$145, triple \$160, quad \$160, all plus tax. (Please contact us at hotel@boskone.org for suite availability.)

Reserve your hotel room online by going to www.boskone.org/hotel.html and following the instructions. You can pick a room in either the party or the non-party block. More information about booking rooms can be found on the web page, and we recommend that method of reserving rooms.

Reservations can also be made by phone at 800-937-8461. If reserving by phone, specify "Boskone 2008 Party Block" or "Boskone 2008 Non-Party Block" to get the convention rate. Additional rooms may be available after the deadline, but only on a first-come first-served basis.

Reservations must be cancelled by 6 pm, two days before your check-in date, or the credit card used to guarantee the room will be charged for the first night's stay.

Directions to Boskone

By Car

The main entrance to the hotel is from Summer St. You would go in from the D St. side only if you're parking there. (Also, note that as the final repair work for the tunnel ceilings proceeds routing through south Boston changes, so be sure to keep an eye on the posted information!)

From the NORTH

- Take I-93 South and go into the tunnel
- Take the Purchase St. Exit.
- Take a left as you exit the ramp (follow signs to the shore). You should pass the convention center [BCEC] on your right side after a short way.
- Take a right at the first stoplights after the BCEC.
- Go up one block and you should be crossing Summer St.
- Take a right and a quick left to pull into the hotel.

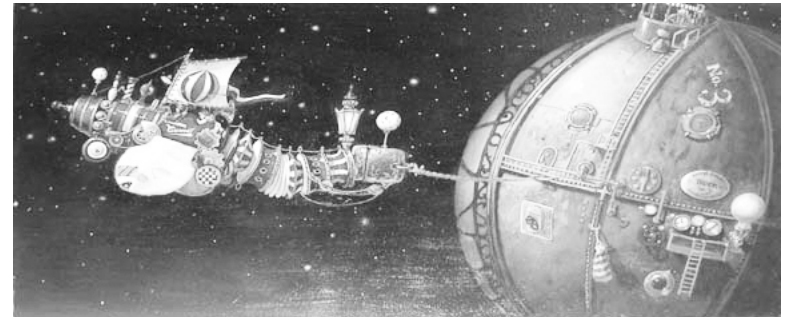

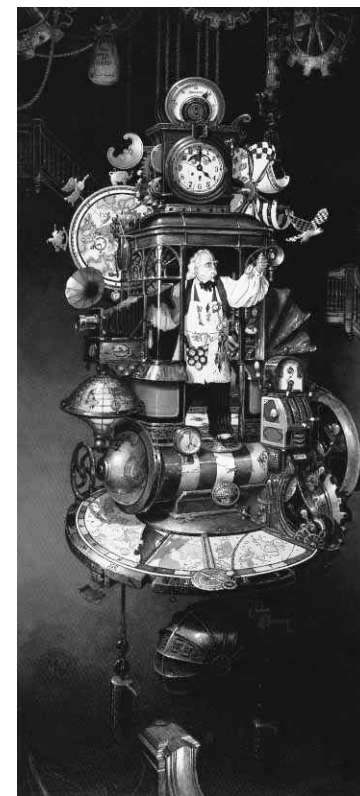
